The Sankofa Conversation Series on Structural Racism Fall Semester Programming

The Sankofa Conversation Series is the beginning of a university-wide process committing UMass Boston to becoming a leading anti-racist and health-promoting public university. Programming for the fall semester is intended to bring about a cultural transformation of our campus community. This series of conversations represents an important initial process for making manifest a democratic citizenship which must become a primary obligation of UMass Boston as a public university.

The series takes its name from a symbol of the Akan people in what is now the West African nation of Ghana. The word "Sankofa" can be translated as "Looking backward to move forward." The symbol shows a bird with its feet pointed forward as it moves ahead, but with its head looking backward to the past. In its bill the bird holds an egg, a symbol of the future. The wisdom of the Akan tells us that we must critically evaluate our history, reject what is no longer relevant, and bring forward only what is useful for creating a better future. These conversations are meant to help the UMass Boston community to do exactly that as we build an anti-racist, health-promoting institution.
